Wonderful Waterford

Waterford, the oldest city in Ireland, is a wonderful mix of the old and the new, history, culture and innovation. It is a city of colour and excitement. A rapidly developing and progressive city, Waterford has many attractions - its galleries and Museums, its busy streets full of fascinating shops, small lanes to stroll through with 1,000 years of history meeting you on virtually every street corner, choice cuisine to suit every taste and every pocket, lively pubs and friendly smiles.

The Sporting Life

Sport is a major part of everyday life in The Déise, be it participating or merely shouting on your team. Hurling is the first thing that springs to mind but the story doesn't just end there. Waterford is surrounded by water, both rivers and sea. There are lots of beaches in the county, with buses every hour to nearby Tramore, where students can take part in swimming, sailing, surfing and kite surfing. Waterford also has great facilities for horse riding, golf, GAA, walking trails, tag rugby, badminton and running. The list truly is endless. The Regional Sports Centre and the Kingfisher Club with its gym, pool and spa facilities are both within five minutes walk of the main campus at WIT.

Nightlife

Waterford has a great variety of pubs and nightclubs and a long theatrical and musical tradition. The local arts centre, Garter Lane, holds many exhibitions of art, design and photography and it runs regular workshops where young people can participate in drama, dance and other artistic activities. Garter Lane also has a modern theatre where the acclaimed Red Kettle theatre company stages most of its productions. The Theatre Royal hosts the Waterford International Light Opera festival each year along with a variety of other productions.

College Hall on WIT's campus is now the centre of choice for large-scale musical events. Waterford has become a haven for good food at reasonable prices. Gourmet, vegetarian, ethnic, pizza and pub grub.....there's something to suit every taste.

Shopping

Waterford offers a choice to shoppers ranging from sophisticated fashion shops, craft shops, modern malls including City Square to superb delicatessens and colourful traditional, family owned shops. Documentation for Exchange

It is the responsibility of the exchange student to ensure that you have completed all documentation prior to departure from WIT.

Failure to complete your documents whilst in Waterford could lead to problems with your home university and delays in your Erasmus grant or funding.

Please see checklist below.

- Learning agreement
- Certificate of arrival (if required by your home university)
- Certificate of Departure (if required by your home university)
- Ensure you have updated your postal address for your home country prior to departure to ensure Examination results and WIT correspondences are sent to the correct postal address.

NOTE: It is the responsibility of all Exchange Students to have a health insurance policy in place that covers their study period at WIT.

Visa Requirements

It is the responsibility of applicants to check the visa requirements for study in Ireland. Please contact the Embassy of Ireland or the Consulate in your home country. The Irish Naturalisaton and Immigration Service at the Department of Justice, Equality and Law Reform is responsible for determining Irish immigration policy. Please see their website: http://www.inis.gov.ie/

Some Non-EU applicants do not require an entry visa for Ireland – please see the Frequently Asked Questions section on <u>www.inis.gov.ie</u> for more details. However, you must register with our Immigration officer within 30 days of arrival. The International Office will provide supporting documentation and arrange an appointment with the local Immigration Officer. The cost of a study visa for either a semester or the full academic year is \in 300.00.

Students will also be required to supply the following information:

- Valid passport
- Letter of support from the International Office
- Bank statement need to show a minimum of €1500 for a semester or €3000 for a full year
- Evidence of Health Insurance (minimum cover of hospital expenses)

Living Costs

The cost of living in Waterford is significantly lower than the cost of living in Dublin. Here are some guidelines about costs for an average student: All prices are in Euro

Accommodation: €75 - €85 single room per week (college managed)

Meals on campus: There are a number of restaurants on campus. These all serve meals daily with a basic meal costing approximately $\in 5.00 - \epsilon 6.50$.

Transport: W.I.T. operates a free bus service for students traveling from college managed apartments to the main campus. Students must show their WIT card to avail of this free service.

If students wish to travel to Dublin, they can do so with Rapid Express coaches <u>www.rapidcabs.com</u> The prices are below are student prices on production of their WIT card.

Bus Eireann - <u>www.buseireann.ie</u> - operates a daily bus route from Waterford city to WIT. Prices are approximately €1.45 single fare.

Accommodation

Student apartments are clean, comfortable and well furnished. They are safe, near the campus and customised for the needs of students. Staying in WIT Managed accommodation is also a good way to meet other students and to make friends. We advise you to book your accommodation as soon as you receive your acceptance letter.

Getting to WIT

Most International flights go direct to Dublin airport. From Dublin there are a number of possibilities of getting to Waterford. Regular bus services connect Dublin airport to Waterford city either with Rapid Express bus services <u>www.rapidcabs.com</u> or with Bus Eireann <u>www.buseireann.ie</u>

This journey takes approximately 3 hours and the fare is \in 16.00 single. You can also get to Waterford by train. You can get a local bus from the airport directly to Heuston station, then catch a train from here directly to Waterford. From Waterford train station you can get a taxi or local bus to WIT or your accommodation.
